Medical Staff Briefing – Dr. Mark Peterson, NSHC Medical Director	 Dr. Mark Peterson gave medical staff update on the following: Alaska: things were fairly stable, we have a total of 755 cumulative cases, there was 21 on Saturday, 12 on Sunday, 2 seafood workers/non-resident on each day that tested positive. 37 new cases over the weekend, 475 recovered, since the beginning of this 61 patients have been hospitalized, 12 deaths ANMC: 0 inpatient, 59 outpatient, 12 employees NSHC: 6 positive, 5 recovered, 1 active, 7,862 test done, 3,250 unique patients, all negative except the 6 positive, quit a few pending The city council will be meeting this evening and Norton Sound will be sending an email on our recommendation Press release about 5th COVID case: Our 5th case was a village regional case and they had a COVID-19 rapid analyzer test done that was positive There was a question about this individual because it was unusual for them to be positive because they didn't fit the description, they had not traveled, they had not been around anyone that tested positive so it was unusual The physician that was handling the case decided to do a repeat test which they did a couple of hours later which ended up being negative Now you have a positive and a negative test which is more likely that one would 	

	get a false negative than a false positive
	- We felt very strongly that this was a positive case
	- We have to take every positive case very seriously
	- Those are the results we had and we had to act on them so we did
	- We sent a group out to the village to test and we did quarantine for everybody
	- We also did a state test on that patient that same day
	- That took a week before that test came back and we tested two additional times
	on the following two days and we did that because there is a test base strategy
	where if you get two negative test on a patient more than 24 hours apart you can consider them cure
	- All three of the test ended up being negative
	- What that means is that they are recovered because they had two test more than
	24 hours apart and they were negative
	- They are out of isolation and they cure and may go back home with no problem
	- They are not infectious and not a risk to anyone else
	- What does that mean about the positive test? The answer is we don't know and
	that the evidence suggest that it might have been a false positive, but again we have to take a positive as a positive because the risk is too high if we don't
	- In the end we did the right thing by isolating and quarantining and testing others
	- What does this mean for the analyzer in Nome? Well we know the other test that
	have been positive have been very most likely accurate and true positives
	 We have done 7,000 test and a huge number has been done on our rapid
	analyzer
	- If we have one false positive out of all those test that we run that is within the
	realm of that analyzer and doesn't mean that analyzer is not accurate, and no test
	is 100% perfect
	- Even if a doctor test you for strep or the flu there will be false positives there too
	- As we go down the road if we get any positive on our analyzer we will be
	treating it as a positive

Question and Comments	• Can somebody tabulate the number of people getting off the jet and number of people getting tested? The percentage?
	 RL: Louis Murphy our Nurse Manager in PCC said it's a matter of
	getting in touch with the airport manager before each flight and
	learning the number of patients coming off that flight.
	 Dr. P: We can report the number of people getting tested but we don't
	always know how many are on the plane.
	 RL: Based on what Louis knows and the number he can compare that to the average is about 35%.
	• Can the COVID-19 testing detect any other viruses?
	 Dr. P: as for the accuracy of the COVID-19 testing we know that with
	the rapid analyzer or the state equipment, or with the ANMC
	equipment that a positive is almost 100% of the time a true positive. So
	the false positive rate for all the testing equipment is very low. False
	the faise positive face for an the testing equipment is very low. Paise

negatives on our analyzer, the states, or ANMC there could be more of
those. Could another virus cause the test to be positive? I do not know
that to be true.
 Are food items that are packages safe? Like fruit and veggies?
 Dr. P: It's extremely unlikely to pass the virus through the food item
itself. Any package you get it's possible for the virus to be on a
package and passed to another human. That's not a common way of
getting the virus and is a rare way and packages coming to Alaska
usually sit around 2-3 days. So once you get mail we have suggested to
let it sit for a couple of days before opening.
