2024 Summercise Internship

Norton Sound Health Corporation: Nome, Alaska

Who we are:

The Chronic Care Active Management and Prevention (CAMP) program is a disease prevention health promotion department at Norton Sound Health Corporation (NSHC). The department is funded by Special Diabetes Program for Indians (SDPI) through IHS. The team consists of Registered Dietitians, Tobacco Quit Coaches, Lactation Counselors and other health educators who may provide mentorship throughout the internship. We are a team that values excellent communication, positive teamwork, and high-quality customer service.

What we are looking for:

We are looking for energetic and creative individuals looking for experience teaching youth about healthy living. Norton Sound Health Corporation located in Nome, Alaska is recruiting 7 college interns for the summer of 2024 to coordinate the award-winning program, *Summercise*. Recognized by the American Diabetes Association for the John Pipe Voices of Change Award for Innovation, Summercise is a nutrition education and physical fitness program for the youth of the Norton Sound region. Over the past 20+ years, approximately 180 students from around the United States have come to Nome to work with local youth in efforts to prevent diabetes and learn about the Alaska Native culture, including outdoor activities and traditional foods.

Summercise is held in numerous locations around Nome, a small, tight-knit community and is an inspiring program to provide nutrition education and get youth active throughout the summer. Summercise interns lead all aspects of Summercise from planning to wrap-up and everything in between. Interns will also be a supervisor/mentor to at least one high school assistant who will assist with the groups you are leading and teaching. Each intern is assigned one group of Summercise participants, usually around 25 participants. Classes change weekly over a period of six weeks. There will be a one-week break for travel to villages.

What do we consider a good candidate?

- <u>Working with Children</u>: Students should enjoy and have a strong background and experience working with large groups of children ages 5-12. This can include summer camps, after school programs, coaching, boys and girls club, etc.
- <u>Nutrition & Health Knowledge</u>: Students should be pursuing an undergraduate program in one of the following areas:
 - Nutrition and Dietetics
 - Exercise Physiology
 - Other preventative healthcare fields
 - $\circ\,$ American Indian/Alaska Native Studies with an emphasis on Native Health Initiatives

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- <u>Leadership Qualities</u>: professional behavior, strong value set, good role model, ability to motivate and inspire, teamwork, positive energy, maturity and the ability and willingness to mentor a high school student
- <u>Flexibility & Strong Work ethic</u>: Interns who exemplify a strong work ethic coupled with flexibility receive the most out of their experience as an intern. We seek interns who consistently go above and beyond to represent their team well.
- <u>Initiative</u>: self-starter, independent thinker, creative, problem-solver, ability to multi-task, culturally sensitive, open-minded, and motivated to learn
- <u>Working within a Team</u>: Experience working within a team is highly encouraged. This may include sports teams, leadership teams, committees and clubs, etc.
- <u>Physical Fitness</u>: Only students with demonstrated abilities to teach physical fitness in addition to nutrition/health knowledge will be considered. Physical fitness is not limited to specific sports or activities. Be creative!
- <u>High Priorities</u>: Instructors for swimming/lifeguards, experience in the outdoors, dance/gymnastics/cheerleading, ball sports, cooking classes, experience in a specialty sport or activity, and many more. We are always looking for new things to offer the kids.

What we offer:

This is an unpaid internship that lasts 11 weeks. We will provide you with housing, pay your airfare to and from Nome, provide a pass to the recreational center in Nome, and a \$1200.00 stipend for food expenses and luggage fees. You will be sharing housing and/or a room with another Summercise intern or NSHC staff. Your housing will be fully furnished with kitchen supplies, furniture, beds, bed linens, washer and dryer, and internet. Housing may be co-ed, but rooms are gender specific. With understanding that many internships offer an hourly wage, we have outlined the estimated cost of being an intern in Nome, Alaska which is covered in lieu of an hourly wage.

Estimated Cost for Summercise Internship (per intern):

Airfare; Roundtrip from Continental States to Nome, Alaska: ~\$1100.00 Housing/Lodging in Nome, Alaska for 11 weeks: \$4,400.00 Internet: \$358.00 Gym Membership for 11 weeks: \$140.00 Gas/Transportation: currently, gas is \$6,29/gal: vehicles are hard to come

Gas/Transportation: currently, gas is \$6.29/gal; vehicles are hard to come by but rent at \$200.00 per day.

Initial Groceries/Pantry Items: estimated \$100.00 Village Airfare: \$580.00

Village Lodging: \$159/night

Total Estimated Cost Per Intern: \$7,667.00

All of the above expenses are 100% covered by the NSHC CAMP Department. There is no cost to the intern, and they receive a stipend for food for \$1200.00. The only other predicted expense to interns is personal experiences within the state and necessary attire for personal comfort during the summer in Alaska (such as, rain boots, rain jackets, etc.)

A two-week orientation and preparation period will be provided prior to the start of Summercise on June 10^{th}

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Summercise Intern Expectations and Priorities:

- 3. Weekly rotations and assignments
- 4. Unscheduled tasks assigned by CAMP staff
- 5. Community collaboration/partnership/volunteerism
- 6. Interns are expected to work on numerous projects and handle competing responsibilities. Weekend and evening work should be anticipated and expected, this is considered a full-time role. A staff member will be present at all events hosted by interns.
